Shop At Home to Close Its Doors

Media company E.W. Scripps is giving up the struggle to make its money-losing Shop At Home television and online retailing subsidiary profitable and will close the business by June 30.

"This is not the outcome we had hoped for when we acquired Shop At Home nearly four years ago," Kenneth Lowe, Scripps' president and CEO, said in a statement.

Shop At Home, based in Nashville, Tenn., is the nation's fourth-largest TV shopping outlet with a reach of 57 million households.

While Scripps has enjoyed success with its Food Network, Home & Garden Television and other cable networks and its online comparison shopping business that includes Shopzilla, Shop At Home has lagged behind QVC, HomeShopping Network and ShopNBC.

"I think the primary constraint was our inability to secure high-quality channel positions on cable systems around the country," said Tim Stautberg, a company spokesman.

He said Shop At Home, which sells goods to television viewers and visitors to its Web site, also found it difficult to acquire unique merchandise to put it ahead of its competitors.

Scripps bought 70 percent of Shop At Home's share for \$49.5 million four years ago from Shop At Home Inc. and gained full control two years later when it acquired the remaining portion and five Shop At Home-affiliated broadcast television stations. The total value of the two transactions was about \$285 million.

Shop At Home's 650 full-time employees were notified on Tuesday that the business would be closing.

Benedict, Hartman, Pennington Named SBE Fellows
Short Circuit

Three members of the Society of Broadcast Engineers (SBE) were recently elected to the membership grade of Fellow by the SBE Board of Directors. The nominations of Raymond C. Benedict, CPBE, Gary S. Hartman, CPBE and Troy D. Pennington, CPBE were acted on by the Board at their April 23 meeting in Las Vegas.

The recipients will be recognized during the SBE National Awards Dinner, held as a part of the SBE National Meeting, September 27 in Verona, New York. The annual meeting is being held in conjunction with the Broadcast & Technology Expo, sponsored by SBE Chapter 22 of Central New York.

Ray Benedict is Director of Spectrum Engineering for CBS Corporation and is responsible for the FCC licensing and engineering regulatory compliance matters for all of the CBS owned entities. Benedict has almost 50 years of service to the broadcast industry, beginning in his home state of Vermont.

Benedict is an active member of SBE, serving as a member of the Board of Directors in the early 1980's and again from 1996 through 1999. He then served as Secretary from 2000 through 2001, vice president from 2001 through 2003 and then as national president for two terms from 2003 through 2005. He is currently serving on the Board as Immediate Past President. He has been SBE Life Certified at the CPBE level since 1998.

Gary Hartman holds SBE member number 974, having joined SBE on February 3, 1969. His career in broadcast engineering has spanned six decades and has been an active member of SBE Chapter 22 for the last 37 years.

As a charter member of Chapter 22, Hartman held several positions over an eight year period beginning in 1971, including the chairman's post from January 1976 to March 1978.

Hartman served as chairman for the highly successful Chapter 22 SBE regional convention during the early 1980's. About that time, he became involved in the chapter's frequency coordination committee and has served as volunteer Frequency Coordinator for his region for many years.

The third recipient of the rank of SBE Fellow is Troy Pennington, a veteran of more than 35 years in broadcasting. Pennington is Regional Director of Engineering for Cumulus Broadcasting, serving the Alabama, Florida, Georgia and Tennessee areas and is based in Nashville.

Pennington served Chapter 68 in Birmingham as its chapter chairman for two terms and also vice chairman, newsletter editor, secretary/treasurer for three terms and program chairman. He was active in the formation of the chapter in Montgomery and the reorganization of the Huntsville chapter. He is active now with Chapter 103 in Nashville.

He has served the National SBE as President for two terms, vice president, treasurer and twice as a national Director. Additionally, he has served as chairman of the Executive Committee, as a member of the Certification Committee, represented SBE on the NAB Broadcast Engineering Conference planning committee.

Tower Workers Killed

Three Deters Tower Service employees were killed Wednesday when their safety equipment failed while climbing an Iowa Public Television tower near Oakland. The failure caused the men to fall more than 1,000 feet to the ground.

The Pottawattamie County Sheriff said he's working with a local man who has tower climbing experience.

Sheriff Jeff Danker wouldn't release the man's name. But, said he's hoping the man will be able to tell if something is wrong with the climbing gear recovered from the scene of the fall.

Autopsies completed Friday indicate the men died of trauma resulting from the fall. Danker said there were no other medical conditions present in any of the men that may have caused the fall.

Leo Deters, 57, of Norwalk died along with Jason Galles, 27, of Des Moines and Jon McWilliams, 19, of Cumming.

Deters' visitation is planned for Friday at St. Johns Catholic Church in Norwalk from 4:30 to 6:30 p.m.

His funeral will be Saturday morning at 11 a.m.

Apple Cutting Edge News

On the set of the 5:00 News at Clear Channel-owned ABC affiliate KTVX in Salt Lake City, it's easy to see why the show is leading slot. An anchor gleams polished sports clips and the



its time attractive team on a set, the guy requisite quips, weather

presenter, Prospero-like, waves virtual storms across a magically responsive map. It's news business as usual, brought off unusually well.

But off camera, long before the evening show airs, a more potent news advantage plays out in the KTVX ENG (electronic news gathering) vans, where lightweight DV cameras and PowerBook-anchored Final Cut Pro editing stations let reporters and photographers shape their stories where they break.

For KTVX director of engineering David Bird, who made the decision to swap out the station's legacy cuts-only editing systems for a fleet of flexible Power Macs, the change has extended and strengthened his fundamental news capabilities. "Pushing editing out to the edge of our story coverage with Final Cut and the laptops was huge," he says, "but equally big was the transformation of our in-house workflow."

Also extended was the station's concept of local coverage, which suddenly reached into Iraq and Guatemala, not only because local soldiers or Mormon missionaries were making news there, but because the inexpensive, transportable editing stations made remote coverage viable. "Gulf War Greetings" and other news stories filed by a freelance news reporter carrying a consumer-level Sony DV camera, PowerBook and satellite modem were global hits with the local audience — at a total equipment cost of only \$3,500.

Although Bird, until recently a dedicated Windows user, speaks ardently of the benefits delivered by the new system, he confesses that his decision to supplant an accepted traditional fixed editing system with Final Cut Pro flexed editing suites was made more for money than for love.

Instead, Bird added several CinéWave-based Final Cut suites in his production and promotions departments to handle special reports, commercials and effects. The new systems yielded highly-produced sweeps segments and an Emmy Award-winning new on-air look that was completed faster and for considerably less cost than under the old system.

Then — after a year of test-editing news on Final Cut — in just two weeks KTVX replaced their four legacy editing suites with nine Final Cut Pro fixed editing bays (two in sports, seven in news), anchored by dual-processor Power Macs and extended by nine field-friendly PowerBooks.

"Moving the edit process out to the edge meant that photographers who in their tape-to-tape lives never used computers now could edit their own stories," says Bird. "And reporters who never carried a piece of gear were sitting down to work with laptops. They do it because they want to own the story. If they edit the story until it's close to finished, nobody's going to re-do it. The editors just touch it up."
